#### 4. Comments on delivery of each project

#### a. Overall comments on project progress:

RiverConnect and our partners, as well as the general community, have had a tricky year in 2019-2020. Whilst the July-December period on 2019 progressed as usual, January to June 2020 has severely been hindered by restrictions relating to the COVID-19 virus. This has reduced the amount of engagement with the community that the project has been able to deliver, with 2966 people involved in 53 community engagement activities, 1314 school students from 15 schools and 4 kinders, as well as home schooling networks, youth support programs and 1 TAFE learning about the river environment in outdoor classrooms. 36 partnerships maintained and developed, and features in 33 external media items.

However, other targets were still achieved. A 2km upgrade of The Flats Walk track to a crushed rock path is due for completion in the next few weeks and will allow better accessibility for YYNAC's guided Flats Walks and other visitors wishing to learn about local Aboriginal history from the interpretative signage along the path.

While we have not been able to run classes at the river, RiverConnect has adapted our service delivery. Teachers and parents have utilised the suite of resources for learning from home that the Education Officer shared on our website <u>www.riverconnect.com.au</u> and Facebook "RiverConnect - Greater Shepparton".

The Blue Carbon Lab 2 year citizen science project was completed in December and the final report will arrive in the next financial year. This great partnership with Deakin University and local environment groups assesses the levels of carbon sequestered by our local wetlands, Reedy Swamp and Gemmills' Swamp.

RiverConnect has noticed a significant increase in usage of our shared path network over the COVID-19 lockdown period, with an average of 120 visits per day. We are pleased to see locals out enjoying natural spaces for exercise and will work to see that this continues in the future.

#### b. Key achievements and highlights:

- Both Revegetation and Weeding targets were achieved.
- Community-led clean up events have removed over 3 tonnes of rubbish from the Goulburn River.
- Ongoing partnership and delivery collaboration with One Tree Per Child which assists to achieve the revegetation target.
- Hosted 53 community engagement events (18 online) with 2966 participants.

- The beginnings of engagement with a new class at GO TAFE, a VCAL class with approximately 20 students who are unable to attend mainstream schooling.
- Renewed engagement with a Home Schooling Network of approximately 8 students.
- A community event held in January to provide community members with an opportunity to do something to help wildlife affected by the 2019-2020 bushfires was a very successful event, with great media coverage and high interest from community participants.
- Excellent engagement on Facebook and Instagram, particularly through the COVID lockdown period. We have 775 Facebook followers and 273 Instagram followers. Of the 18 online activities we ran during lockdown, we had 1948 views and 620 likes/comments/shares and completed activities.
- We have continued to develop our partnerships with community groups, most notably Cussen Park Advisory Committee and Turtles Australia. With these two groups and trained nest-detection dogs from Latrobe University, we surveyed Cussen Park for turtle nests and taught community members and Council staff how to use nest protection kits, which will prevent cats and foxes from eating turtle eggs. We have protected two nests in Greater Shepparton this year with nest protection kits funded by the Hugh Williamson Foundation and put together by community members.

#### c. Challenges and issues faced that have directly impacted on project delivery in the reporting period:

- 1. Finalisation of assets register of council assets on Parks Victoria managed land remains an on-going activity that has hindered the progress of proposed projects which are located on Parks Victoria managed land.
- 2. Engagement with existing VCAL classes and programs was difficult at the beginning of the year due to the merger of the 4 Public Secondary schools which led to both teachers and students changing campuses, and a period of time required for this change to settle.
- 3. The emergence of COVID-19 and its associated lockdowns and movement restrictions, then finally schools being closed has severely impacted on the delivery of the school based education program during the January-June 2020 period. A few school events were able to be held just prior to the lockdown, and as some restrictions eased, however the program has been limited to online engagement only, through providing teachers with access to activities for students to undertake within their homes. This will likely continue to have an impact further into the remainder of 2020.

#### d. How these challenges and/or issues are going to be mitigated or addressed:

- 1. Council senior management are actively working with Parks Victoria senior management to complete the assets register of council assets on Parks Victoria managed land. Individual works agreements were obtained for Route 3 and Route 5 paths projects which will allow these works to be completed within the required timeframes for each grants.
- Continue to keep avenues for communication with all schools open, and promote our ability to be flexible to the needs of schools, teachers and students. This includes being available for online activities, Zoom classes, providing activities for teachers to facilitate, and putting together 'how to' video clips.
- e. If previous mitigations have been identified in earlier reports, how successful have these been?
  1. The appointment of a full time ongoing Environment Officer within the GSCC Sustainability and Environment team as seen the One Tree Per Child Project begin to run much more smoothly than in past years, with the Environment Officer having more planning time to get the project running for the year.
- f. A statement about the Project's approach for, and progress towards, supporting aboriginal engagement and collaboration:
  - Increased staffing at Yorta Yorta Nation Aboriginal Corporation over the last few months has resulted in renewed involvement. This has included consistent attendance from both staff and Elders at RC meetings and engagement with projects. The Project Officer has built good relationships with both new and existing staff over 2019-20 and is working to improve communications between Council departments and YYNAC to allow smooth completion of the RC paths projects.
  - Several new projects led by the Aboriginal community are currently being developed. Uncle Ruben Baksh of the Elders Council for Yorta Yorta Nation is working with officers to secure a site and funding to operate an Aboriginal mens shed. This project has been discussed for a long time in the Council and community, and RiverConnect is proud to be supporting the group. In addition, Corey Walker (previous teacher at ASHE) has incorporated an Indigenous Fishing Club and RiverConnect will assist the club to run their launch on December 5<sup>th</sup> at Victoria Park Lake, Shepparton.
