

## **10 Years of RiverConnect**



RiverConnect aims to see the Goulburn and Broken Rivers known as the life and soul of the Shepparton and Mooroopna communities. Our rivers bring life to the region and have many untapped secrets and opportunities. RiverConnect began in 2005 and aims to inspire the community to enjoy and protect our rivers, to connect with other people and cultures in the river area, and support agencies to manage the river as partners.

Under the Strategic Plan 2011-2016, RiverConnect has had success in five key priority areas:



## Connecting Community

RiverConnect Paths Masterplan completed; three Flood Markers at Shepparton, Mooroopna and Murchison; Boulevard Bush Reserve and The Flats interpretative signage; 6,400 participants at 125 community activities.



Connecting Aboriginal People

The Flats cultural walks and signage; 3,900 people attended events featuring Aboriginal culture and history.



65% of RiverConnect schools participating in events and activities annually; 6,300 students visited rivers; Regular blogs and updates on RiverConnect website by schools.

Rubbish collected from 36.3ha by VCAL students; Boulevard Bush Reserve Environmental Management Plan developed; Weed and Hollow GIS mapping and Biodiversity audits along river.



65 articles/radio/tv – average 13 per year; 41 presentations to groups; Quarterly e-newsletter sent to 267 subscribers; Facebook group with 200 members.

The vision and purpose will be achieved by realising longterm goals that increase:

participation in, and

the river environment and its cultural heritage, through seven connection priorities for action.

- 50% of Greater Shepparton schools have at least one class engaging with the river environment annually, involving 1,000 students
- 1 tertiary education project in the RiverConnect area
- 1,000 participants annually in traditional owner-led events in the river environment
- Significant whole-of-community events and projects celebrate our shared history
- Shared path network is extended by 9km and one river crossing built
- Opportunities and spaces are created that people actively use
- Extent and quality of native vegetation and water quality is improved
- Access for various community sectors, from anglers to the elderly, is increased at
- Decrease of priority weeds along shared paths and priority areas
- 75% decrease in volume of illegally dumped rubbish
