Activity 6: Making a Poota

Aim

To provide a collecting tool to assist with the investigation and classification of insects and other 'mini-bugs' for identification.


Activity instructions

- 1. Cut a drinking straw in half then cut a lengthwise split at one end.
- 2. Place a small piece of pantyhose over the end of the straw with the split.
- 3. Push the split straw into the unsplit straw and tape the two together.

Students then use the 'Poota' on a field trip to a bushland area. They collect small creatures by sucking them into the straw where they are trapped by the pantyhose. The 'mini-bug' can then be tapped into a jar for closer observation and identification.

Resources needed

Drinking straw, piece of pantyhose, sticky tape.
