### **Gemmills Swamp Nature Conservation Reserve**







Gemmills Swamp is a high value wetland situated on the floodplain of the Goulburn River. It is home to many native birds and is a great spot for birdwatching. The bioremediation wetland, off McFarlane Road, treats stormwater runoff from Mooroopna before it enters Gemmills Swamp and is accessible via an unsealed path beginning on the northern side of McFarlane Road.

# J. A. Douglass Park





Situated on Echuca Rd in Mooroopna, J. A. Douglass Park borders Gemmills Swamp and is a gateway to various walks and birdhides.

### Kaieltheban Park









Accessible via Archer Street in Mooroopna, Kaieltheban Park is believed to have been a favoured camping and fishing site for the Kailtheban tribe, part of the Yorta Yorta Family Group.

## **Chinamans Gardens**









Ah Wong, a Chinese immigrant, set up a market garden, selling vegetable produce to Mooroopna and surrounding residents. Chinamans Gardens, is the site of this former vegetable garden and provides views of the Goulburn River. Accessible off McLennan St, Mooroopna.

#### The Flats





The Flats is a significant Aboriginal area, home to many Aboriginal families after the Cummeragunja Walk Off in 1939. Interpretative signage is located on the signed walk, which can be accessed by foot from the shared path running alongside the Midland Highway. Ample car parking is located on McLennan Street, Mooroopna.



## **Daintons Bridge**







Named after the first engineer to build a bridge over the Goulburn River, James Henry Dainton, this site features a boat ramp, located on the southern side of the bridge. A fishing jetty is also accessible at this site when river levels are low. Informal trailer parking is

A sealed loop track to the north or south of the playground along The Boulevard, gives you great access and views to the Goulburn River. People with limited mobility may require assistance when accessing the loop track due to the steep descent from the road.

#### **Jordans Bend**









A good section of remnant vegetation in the heart of Shepparton which is home to the endangered Squirrel Glider. Unsealed car park provides access to the shared path network for people with limited mobility.

## 10 Boulevard Bush Reserve







Boulevard Bush Reserve is a section of unique River Red Gum woodland. Originally part of the Wanganui Estate, and later owned by the Tassicker family, the reserve is of high environmental and historical value. Follow an unsealed walking path with seating and interpretative signage to learn about the native plant and animal species that can be seen in the area.

## **Shepparton Weir/Fishway**







The weir was built to provide a reliable river height for urban water extraction. The newly constructed Fishway enables fish to move up and down stream, essentially using the Fishway as a ladder.

## **Reedy Swamp**









Reedy Swamp is the southern point of the Lower Goulburn National Park and provides valuable habitat and breeding sites for a large number of waterbirds.

#### **Victoria Park Lake Precinct**









This attractive environmentally sustainable public open space is used for a wide range of recreational activities and is close to Aquamoves, Cafés and a Skate Park

#### The Confluence





Only accessible along the shared path network (walk or cycle), the confluence is the point where the Broken River flows into the Goulburn River.

### **Australian Botanic Gardens** Shepparton





The former Kialla tip site has been transformed to showcase local indigenous species of the Shepparton and Mooroopna Region. Follow compacted pathways to the top of the huge mound and enjoy the spectacular views across the surrounding bushland along the Goulburn and Broken Rivers to the Strathbogie Ranges. Entry is off Riverview Drive.

#### Raftery Bend







A beautiful stretch of bushland, with access to the Goulburn at a number of bends. Access via the northern end of Raftery Road.
